

This little compact book appears to cover just about everything you would want to know about cemeteries and graves including but not limited to etiquette in the grave yard itself or what to expect from the cemetery caretakers, or the records found at the cemetery. Additionally, there are some odd stories such as one about the dog named Stiffy Green, who would not leave his departed master. 
From the Magazines...

The latest issue of **Internet Genealogy** magazine has an instructive listing of "10 Databases You Didn't Know Were on Ancestry..." so, we will explore and evaluate these before the DNA program. There is always so much more to learn with Genealogy and so much more becoming available! It appears that each is searchable with simple keywords. There's a historical postcard collection, a photo collection from the Library of Congress, and a Craftsperson file. What intrigued me is a complete database of the catalogs of Sears Roebuck & Co. from 1896 through 1993. Think of the story you can put together for your family with all that "stuff" from your people's time!
